Report of the June 2025 SC Annual Conference

Leaving church after worship on June 8th, I traveled to Greenville SC where the SC Annual Conference was being held. As always, the first thing we do is check-in at the registration desk to receive a badge and packet of information about the worship services, meetings, resolutions to be voted on and budget to be approved. (It's always a good idea to have a "3-ring binder" for these papers!)



The theme for this year's conference was "See the Possibilities, Live the Promises" – The Possibilities of a Seed. On Sunday (the first worship service) Bishop Leonard Fairley called for the people of God to take holy risk and plant seeds of Christ's hope even when they couldn't see the outcome. His message was centered on promise and perseverance. The lyrics of "Hymn of Promise" were recited which lifts up how a flower comes from a bulb and an apple from a tree and Bishop Fairley shared how sometimes we cannot even imagine what is to come. But God sees and knows, and we must trust that if we plant and sow the seeds, God will bring fruit somehow and some way.

After the worship service, there were Commissioning, Ordination and Retirement Recognition Services. Bishop Fairley ordained three full elders, ordained one full deacon, commissioned eight as provisional elders, two as provisional deacons and recognized 32 retiring clergy.

The evening offering taken amounted to approx. \$10.500 +/- for the SC Conference Seminary Students Scholarship Fund which provides scholarship awards to candidates for ministry from South Carolina attending United Methodist seminaries and theological schools.

Monday was a full day of "business." In addition to greetings, organizational motions and the consent calendar, there were a number of actions. The Conference approved two changes to the Standing Rules. One change added the conference secretary to the Ministry Advisory Team. The other change reduced the size of the Board of Pension and Health Benefits from 18 to 12 persons.



The Conference passed a motion to go on record expressing concern about the federal government making deep cuts to needed federal jobs, health care, education nonprofit agencies, universities and discrimination without justice against the vulnerable, immigrants and LGBTQ+.

The Council on Finance & Administration offered the first reading of a proposed budget of \$10.3 million which is \$1.4 million less than 2025's budget. CF&A shared that an \$800,000 rebate from 2023 separating churches will be applied so churches will only be apportioned \$9.5 million. (This will reduce what we are asked to pay for apportionments in 2026.)

The body approved 5 resolutions (4 with little fanfare and one twice-amended that took an hour and forty minutes to debate.) The 5 that passed were: LGBTQIA+ Inclusion in Ministry; Our Responsibility for Personal Health; Upholding the Dignity of All Mothers; Supporting South Carolinians Living with Dementia; and Recommit to Collegiate Ministry as a Priority of the Church.

Monday afternoon 18 new local pastors were examined and licensed to serve the Annual Conference. The day ended with a service of Prayer and Praise. The offering received on Monday amounted to approx. \$3,980.00 for the *Healing Guatemala Mission*. This mission focuses on having surgeons remove cataracts from children's eyes to make it possible for them to see.

Annual Conference Report - cont'd

Tuesday was another day of "business" which consisted of reports from various committees. We also Joined our counterparts around the world and voted on regionalization and three other amendments to the denomination's constitution: expanding gender and disability inclusion in church membership; standing against racism and colonialism; and clarifying requirements for clergy-delegate elections. The amendments were all passed by the required two-thirds vote at the 2024 General Conference. But because they will change the UMC constitution, they require ratification by at least two-thirds of the total voting members of all 127 annual conferences around the world.

The Committee on Equitable Compensation requested and received a 2.5% cost of living increase for 2026 to ensure pastors can continue to pay their bills given the large amount of inflation experienced in the past few years. The Conference Board of Pension & Health Benefits reviewed their changes for the coming year. Those covered (clergy, deacons, lay employees of the conference and others under conference insurance) will see an increase in health care costs for this year, going up roughly \$100/month in 2026.

Tuesday evening, there was a Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving for the 52 clergy and spouses who died over the past conference year. As the bishop read the names of those honored, a candle was lit on the altar and a bell rung in remembrance. Our very own "Cynthia" took part in the ceremony being the flag bearer!







Wednesday, June 11, 2025, was the final day of this Annual Conference. There were several more business items to be heard. We approved the Adoption of the Consent Calendar. We approved the closing of six churches and the merger of two churches into one new church. Most of the closures were because of declining membership. There was a service of "Lament to Hope" led by Bishop Leonard Fairley. This service honored the pain experienced by many over division and grief in separation. The South Carolina Conference has lost more than 225 churches these last several years because of theological differences about homosexuality. Each person was given a stone to symbolize pain and various people offered petitions—mourning the uncertain church, the discord and division, the weakness of witness, those who lost churches to call home, clergy who led churches who left the UMC and all who grapple with feelings of betrayal and confusion. As the petitions were spoken, Bishop Fairley dropped a stone into the baptismal font, asking people to imagine they are handing over their laments to God. He urged the body not to let their tears go to waste: "After the weeping is done, plant some gardens. Plant some seeds that sow love, peace and justice." The people were invited to come forward to surrender their lamentations to God, placing the stones in baskets in an effort to move forward in hope.

Bishop Fairley then led the body in the fixing of appointments, which cemented where each pastor will serve this conference year. This ended the 2025 Annual Conference.

HISTORY HAPPENINGS

Writing on the Wall

The flowing excerpt is taken from the article entitled "Layer in Time" from the LOWCOUNTRY MONTHLY, January 2001. It tells the story of St. Luke's restoration of the slave gallery.

...Longtime members insist that they recall the rumors of graphite graffiti existing, hidden under layers paint of the walls of the old slave balcony. "I've heard some rumors about that" admits Martha Cramer of Bluffton, a member since 1962. "I've heard. It was for the black people." Another parishioner petite, cordial Elnora Ekholm who has also attended since 1962, remembers the stories of words on the walls. I'm fascinated by the history," she says of possible listing of slave or army personnel. "I'd love to know."

Penn Center director Emory Campbell concurs, for area blacks whose family roots go back to that era, exposing those words may shed new historical light on both their backgrounds and on the rich Gullah culture of the Lowcountry barrier islands—a culture which today is threatened with extinction via assimilation in the face of the area's explosive development. Columbia mural and art conservationist Craig Crawford may be the person who can help Ekholm and the rest of the congregation discover just what is on those walls.

Retained by the board of trustees, Crawford recently performed test patches at various sites on the balcony wall, revealing "writing that was recovered –on top of a thin whitewash that is covering the plaster wall.

The writing is in graphite and tentatively adhered to this paint layer. In areas there are multiple layers of oil painting over the writing, while others exhibit only the spackling layer that was applied in the 1980's.

Crawford admits that a certain amount of artistic detective's work is in order in tackling the task. First of course would be to define, via further test patches, those areas most apt to yield success, and the work on a 3x3 foot primary area. To expose multiple layers of the entire wall is simple too costly. Secondly the task requires removing layer upon layer of paint, spackle, liners, and adhesives in the primary search area. Crawford estimates that some parts of the have as many as 7 layers of material covering those samples he exposed in testing, "Getting back through those layers to the graffiti is obviously crucial, he says although infra—red capability may become feasible at some point before that. "Then," he adds, "we can use a thin coat of synthetic co-polymer resin, which is stable and does not discolor. Finally. a protective sheet of Plexiglass, somewhat removed from the wall, would permit viewing. The problem is, as always, cost. To expose the entire area under consideration would probably be close to \$10,000. Even the 3x3 foot area Crawford proposes exposing initially would cost \$1,500.

Still, Crawford and the members of the congregation most closely associated with the project don't feel they are on a wild goose chase in the search. "Gwen Cassidy and Loretta DuBois swear these writings existed in their lifetimes," says incoming board of trustees, Richard Worley. As a retired professor of physics and mathematics at Dyersburg St. College in Tennessee Dr. Worley is not prone to exaggeration, for his words are corroborated by Mrs. Dubois "I remember when the writing was on the wall—probably sometime in the 1970's she said recently. "But when we had the church painted none of us were smart enough to write down what was on the walls. I do remember going up and seeing it. It was old-timey (style) writing and very pretty, and you could read what it said. And I believe it had some dates in it, too. Indeed, some actual writing appears indistinctly on the wall above the right staircase, writing which Crawford estimates rests somewhere between the third and fifth layers."

Note: At the time of this article, church membership was 44.


