April: Resurrection, Renewal, and Loving Boldly

As the earth awakens with the colors of spring, the church also awakens to one of the most powerful seasons of the Christian year. For the church—especially within the United Methodist tradition—the month of April stands as a profound reminder of **resurrection, renewal, and the call to love boldly as disciples of Jesus Christ**. For the family of **St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Bluffton, South Carolina**, this season invites us to reflect deeply on what it means to live as people of the risen Christ.

In many years, April holds the sacred journey of **Holy Week**, the spiritual pathway that leads us through the final days of Jesus' earthly ministry. It begins with **Palm Sunday**, when crowds welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem waving palm branches and shouting, *“Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!”* (Matthew 21:9). Yet within days, the same city would witness betrayal, suffering, and sacrifice.

During **Maundy Thursday**, we remember the Upper Room where Jesus shared the Last Supper with his disciples. It was there that Christ gave what John's Gospel calls the **“new commandment”**: *“Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another”* (John 13:34). This moment continues to shape the heart of the church. As United Methodists often say, we are called to **“Love Boldly”**—to carry Christ's compassion beyond the sanctuary and into our community and world.

Holy Week then leads us through the sorrow of Good Friday to the unmatched joy of **Easter Sunday**, when the empty tomb proclaims the greatest news the world has ever heard: *“He is not here; for He has been raised”* (Matthew 28:6). Easter reminds us that **death does not have the final word—God does**. Through Christ's resurrection we are offered new life, hope, and the promise that light will always overcome darkness.

April also invites the church to consider our responsibility toward the world God created. On **Earth Day (April 22)**, we remember that humanity was entrusted with the care of creation (Genesis 2:15). Caring for the earth is not simply environmental awareness; it is an act of faithful stewardship. Likewise, **World Malaria Day (April 25)** reminds the church of our global mission to care for the sick and vulnerable, echoing Christ's call in Matthew 25:40 to serve “the least of these.”

Within the life of the United Methodist Church, April also carries historical meaning. On **April 23, 1968**, The United Methodist Church was formally established, uniting believers around a shared mission: **“to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.”**

And so, church family, may this April inspire each of us to walk in the light of the empty tomb, to care for God's creation, and to **love boldly**—just as Christ first loved us.

For indeed, *“If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!”* (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Philip Sanders, faithful gospel preacher and speaker for the *In Search of the Lord's Way* program, said this about Jesus recently: “I am captive to the story of an ancient One, born of a virgin, laid in a manger, who loved all, worked miracles, lifted the fallen, healed the sick, raised the dead, and suffered on the cross for my sins. I only wish to tell that story till I can no longer speak. No story is so high, so noble, so touching, so persuasive, or so glorious. No story draws the soul to search the heart and change the life. No story makes one feel the urgency to deny oneself, to take up a cross, and to follow the One who loves. Yes, this story is above human ingenuity; it must be from God Himself. Only the word gospel could fully describe life in Christ. It is life indeed, newness of life, abundant life, and eternal life. It can come from no other than the Father through the Spirit. I am captive to a story greater than all.”

Jesus is not only “there” for us, He has been from the beginning. Jesus is dependable and we should be seeking Him and have confidence He will never let us down. Jesus is:

Savior of the world – Luke 19:10. **The Son of God** – John 9:35-37. **A King** – John 18:37.
Author and finisher of our faith – Hebrews 12:2. **Lord** – 1 Thessalonians 1:1.

May we seek to be dependable, but may we never depend on anyone more than we do Jesus.

Communications: What we do and what we need.

Promoting St Luke's United Methodist Church is the task of the Communication team. We wish to attract members of our community to our church for Worship and Fellowship. It is the Mission work, History and Fellowship of St Luke's that attracts members. Our job is to spread the word.

Here is what we have been doing to date. We do mailings to new members of the community. We have concentrated on Sun City, because it is easy to find the newcomers. If you live in a community, other than Sun City, we would like to find a way in. If you have any ideas, we want to hear them.

We also distribute placards for events that we wish to invite people from outside our congregation. We do that by asking members to visit storefronts in various strip malls. You have made that job easy. We will continue to need your help in that area. We do not distribute placards or invitations for those fellowship events that we don't have the room to invite the community. Examples are Mexican Train, Karaoke and potluck dinners, but you are encouraged to bring a friend or neighbor. Some day we hope to have a fellowship hall that will be large enough to invite the community to all events.

We advertise events that we invite the community to, on Facebook. All our communities and neighborhoods have social media pages. We would like all members to "Share" the postings we make on all their pages. We personally belong to 15 different groups. We post our events multiple times, with great success. Examples of these include Music On The Grounds, Historical Tours, Pancake Breakfasts, Craft Fair and Bake Sales, etc.

We also have a list of the 30 nearest Christian Churches, their pastors, emails and addresses. We sent letters of invitation and fliers of events, as an invitation to their leadership and congregations.

We have listings in the playbills of theater events in Sun City. We would welcome information from the communities you live in, where we could also advertise.

We purchased a new sign at the front of our property that now has two rows of customizable message space.

I cannot forget to mention the acknowledgement we receive from the Mission work that our church performs. It is that giving, we perform that is taking notice.

We welcome any other ideas to help make St Luke's better known in our community. Remember, we are all in this together. Let's spread the word.

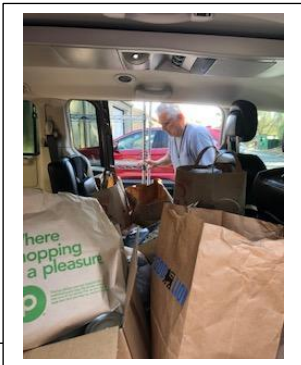
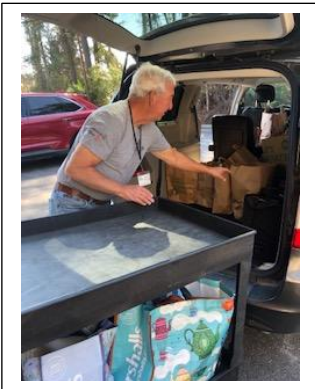
Bluffton Self Help *Second Sunday Food Drive, April 12th.

HISTORY HAPPENINGS

Who's in the Graveyard?

One of the families buried in our graveyard at St. Luke's is the Guerard family. The first Guerard family to land in South Carolina arrived in 1680, starting a line of exceptional people. They were French Huguenots, a name given to the Protestants of France around the middle of the 16th century.

Jacob Guerard was born in Colleton County in 1793 and died in 1863. He attended the South Carolina College and graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a degree in medicine. He married Alice Pendarvis Screven. They had eleven children. Dr. Guerard was a physician and a planter in the Bluffton area.

Dr. Guerard and his wife are buried in a plot behind the church along with their daughter, Anna Richardson Guerard Robertson and her husband, James Robertson. Another daughter, Elizabeth Martha Guerard, married George Cuthbert Heyward, a grandson of Thomas Heyward, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. The Heywards are buried in the Bonaventure Cemetery in Savannah.

(Note: I love reading the history records but find it frustrating that sometimes there are discrepancies. In my records on George Cuthbert Guerard and wife, I found several references to their burial sites. One has them at Bonaventure in Savannah and the other says they are buried at Old House Cemetery in Beaufort County. I actually think that's where his grandfather is buried. Love a good mystery!)

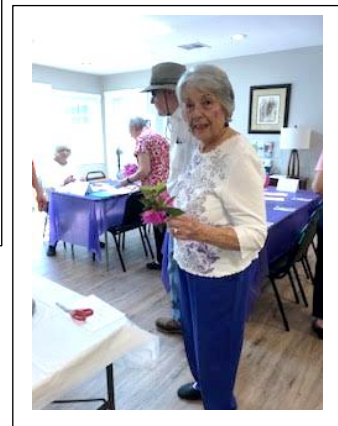
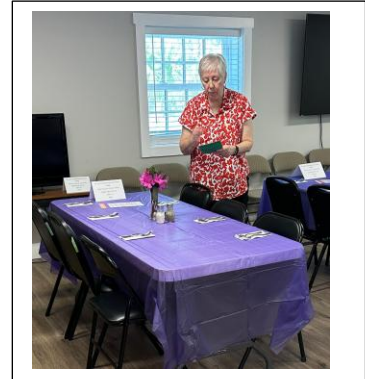

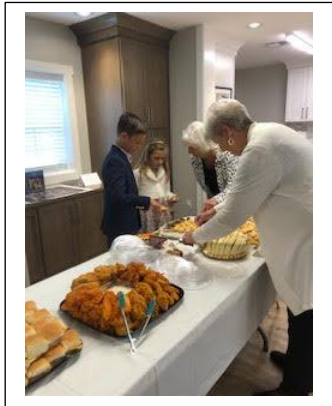

March 15th in anticipation of St. Patrick's Day, Pastor Chris, Janet Jacoby and Jim Smith came dressed for the occasion!

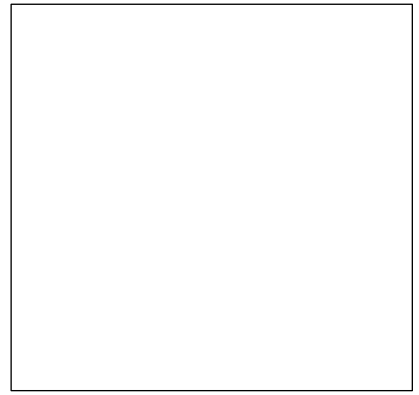
